LINKING MEDICINES TO COMMUNITIES WHEN DISASTER STRIKES: HURRICANE SANDY IN THE U.S.

Each link in a country's integrated supply chain plays a critical role in bringing medicines to as many people as possible. When Hurricane Sandy hit the Northeast region of the United States, challenges in transportation added complexity to getting medicines to the communities most affected. This created delays in patients receiving the medicines that they needed.

Medicine and medical supplies needed during an event have to get to the community in order to mount rapid response.

FedEx allows all Red Cross emergency supplies to be stored in FedEx warehouses. This pre-positioning of supplies helps make sure patients receive what they need as soon as possible.



CHALLENGE

Because medical products are delivered in white, unmarked vans, drivers often have no way to verify to authorities that they are delivering needed supplies to restricted areas.

Patients are not able to access a pharmacy or their pharmacy may be closed.

CVS Pharmacies initiated a program to send mobile alerts to remind patients to refill prescriptions before predicted severe weather events. Healthcare Ready's Rx Open map provided the public with a map of open and closed pharmacies in the disaster areas.
